Youth coming out of the foster care system face so many adverse life experiences that it can be challenging to identify and address each barrier for individual participant success. Next Move operates the Adolfo program that includes a wide range of services and a robust staffing model to ensure participants are properly assessed and put on the right path to becoming self-reliant.

In addition to our campus, youth have the opportunity of living offsite in their own apartment with staggered rent subsidy as they transition into independent living and self-sufficiency. While youth live off campus, they still have access to the onsite resources such as life skills, mental health services, case management, and more.

HEALTH SERVICES:

 Internal onsite mental health/counseling and AOD services: Next Move has a team of MFT Associates and can provide outside service referrals when needed.

COMPREHENSIVE CASE MANAGEMENT:

- Life Skills courses will be a fundamental component of this program and essential to participant success.
- An Education Specialist will play a pivotal role in ensuring the maximization of educational success of each participant.
- Working closely with all staff, an Employment Specialist will focus on getting each participant closure to securing employment and focused on long-term career opportunities.
- Housing and Credit Specialists will work with each participant to ensure a successful transition to permanent housing.
- Connection to a full array of benefits such as; transportation to necessary appointments, school, employment, access to a computer lab, clothing, and furniture.

WHAT IS IT?


Sacramento's Young Adult Prevention and Intervention Program (SacYAPI) launched in March 2018 when Waking the Village, Lutheran Social Services, and Wind Youth Services envisioned a new program to move upstream in addressing youth homelessness. The team expanded in July 2020 to include a P&I Coordinator from the Sac LGBT Center, as well as 3 Housing Retention Specialists to uplift housing efforts. SacYAPI is all about creative solutions that move up the pipeline and prevent youth from entering into homelessness. We believe that through our collaborative efforts, and fueled by the work of SacYAPI, our Community will achieve functional zero in youth homelessness.

HOW DO WE HELP?

We are not directly connected to housing. We assist youth through system navigation, landlord or roommate mediation, warm hand-offs to appropriate services, family reunification, and other creative solutions, See back for more information.

SERVICES OFFERED

SYSTEM NAVIGATION

We assist youth in identifying the right referral and facilitate warm hand-offs of youth to the right referral, Staff make sure the youth does not fall through the cracks of the system. Doc Ready: P&I Assist clients in getting doc ready for housing and for entry into HMIS.

MEDIATION

We have 2 certified mediators on board and can assist in family mediation or between landlords and tenants, and/or between roommates, and work to resolve tenant disputes that jeopardize housing.

RETURN TO RESIDENCY

We assist youth for ability to return to family and strong support systems. Work with youth and family to ensure that this is a healthy and stable placement that is designed to further build supports and strengthen relationships.

BENEFIT ACQUISITION

We assist youth in obtaining the benefits that will ensure that they will remain stably housed. This may include TANF, Cal Fresh, SSI, and the back-up documentation needed to obtain these benefits such as getting an ID.
